Lanu Lanu: The Colour of Language

In Lanu Lanu: The Colour of Language, Samuel Tupou extends upon his ongoing dialogue with Tongan heritage, language, and migration through the lens of colourful abstraction. Engaging colour as a universal mode of communication, Tupou reinterprets the structural motifs of tapa cloth, tattoo, and Lapita pottery into compositions that balance intuition and formal precision. His vivid geometries chart a space between cultural memory and modernist inquiry, revealing abstraction as both a site of displacement and reconnection.

Essay writer David Broker, states that, "Lanu Lanu: The Colour of Language is the result of the twists and turns that artists who have multicultural influences might experience over a lifetime". The hanging fringes, inspired by the brightly coloured threads of Tongan fala mats, articulate a point of cultural convergence where natural fibre meets synthetic material and tradition meets adaptation. In this body of work, Tupou transforms inherited forms into a contemporary visual language that speaks to resilience, hybridity, and the evolving nature of Pacific identity.

Samuel graduated with a Bachelor of Visual Arts, Southern Cross University, Lismore, NSW, in 1997. and is currently based in Cairns (Queensland, Australia). Specialising in screen-printing, he creates artworks that respond to his Tongan and Polynesian heritage, incorporating patterns derived from and inspired by traditional Pacific Island Tapa cloth design.

Colour segments act as oversized pixels that combine to form a recurring pattern and an overall image which is shrouded by pixilation. The photograph's original details and subtleties are removed leaving the viewer with a series of colour structures which when pieced together allude to the original image. The works use proximity and distance to alter the viewers perception. Up close, the works appear to be an abstract assemblage of geometric shapes and colours, whilst at a distance an 8-bit halftone image takes shape.

His recent works draw inspiration from mathematical geometry and 80's arcade game imagery as well as Pacific Island Tapa cloth design and fine mat weaving. These works have been exhibited in several solo shows in recent years including TROPIC ARCADIA, Home of the Arts, Gold Coast (2023); Low Resolution Dreamz, Onespace Gallery, Brisbane (2022); and *Observing Patterns*, Logan Art Gallery (2021).

Samuel's work is collected in numerous public collections including the National Gallery of Australia, Artbank (Sydney), the Print Council of Australia, Cairns Base Hospital, Mater Hospital (Brisbane), the State Library of Victoria, (Melbourne), Artspace Mackay, City of Yarra (Yarra, VIC), Tweed River Regional Gallery, NSW, Wagga Wagga Art Gallery (Wagga Wagga, NSW), Christ Church Grammar (Perth, WA), Southern Cross University (Lismore, NSW), and St. Kevin's College (Melbourne, VIC).

Samuel's major public art commissions include Queensland Wharf Brisbane, Lungfish Dreamz (2024); Aria Property Group, Sunshine of your love (Rise & Pine) Fish Lane, South Brisbane (2022), Queensland Health, Surgical Treatment and Rehabilitation Service (STARS), Herston Quarters, Brisbane (2022); SANDT Developments, Utopia Apartments, DIVE IN (Sunset to Sunrise), Fortitude Valley, Brisbane.

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Samuel Tupou's practice consistently acknowledges the trials of coming to terms with disconnection from his Tongan ancestry, and how reconnection in the colonial territories of Aotearoa (New Zealand) and Australia may be creatively imagined. Pasifika artists' ironic blend of "traditional" motifs with trappings of contemporary popular culture first captured my attention some 25 years ago. I was impressed by the ways they discussed and critiqued the stereotypical colonial mythologies emanating largely from the United States through "Tiki culture", overly romanticised Hollywood movies, or South Seas kitsch. Having developed a characteristic brand of satire, Tupou challenges the seductive misconceptions of popular culture and its misappropriation of motifs and myths for profit.

Although Tupou's practice might be considered as ultra cool contemporary, it has never been a definitive departure from traditional arts and can be more accurately assessed in the context of continually evolving traditions. Aside from being interested in the designs of tattoos and the geometric designs of ancient Lapita pottery, at the centre of Tupou's work are the motifs found in Pacific Island tapa cloth. While the tools may have changed, the versatile cloth made from hand-processed pandanus leaves has changed little, and today tapa continues to occupy a significant place in Tongan customs, used as decoration, clothing, and furniture, as well as in significant ceremonies and the exchange of gifts. Its distinctive designs provide a stable symbolic backdrop for Tupou to pursue ideas acknowledging the wayfinding skills that enabled ancient explorers to populate the Pacific Islands, the impact of colonialism, and challenges faced by Pasifika diaspora as they acclimatise to new homelands.

Lanu Lanu: The Colour of Language is the result of the twists and turns that artists who have multicultural influences might experience over a lifetime. This exhibition comes after a year spent in Poland with Tupou's partner's family. He compares growing up among Tongan relatives who speak a different language to being in Poland, where the new family's language is equally elusive. In both instances, communication is often reduced to a "vibe" of the discernible tones and body language evident in the room.

From this somewhat uncomfortable place, Tupou focuses on colour as a universal language, stripping back the tapa- and pottery-influenced designs of his ancestors to blocks of colour that veer boldly towards hard-edged geometric abstraction. This approach cements Tupou's place in the pantheon of modernist practitioners, exploring an ostensibly more objective, non-representational way of understanding and expressing a continuing sense of dislocation.

In this way, the artist takes on the role of a silent but active observer. Without the guidance of customary motifs and techniques, the audience must also consider the raw vibe of colour and form. Geometric abstraction is defined by the artist, fuelled by intuition, producing an overall ambience of rhythm and harmony drawn from the adept combination of colour, line, and form. Lanu Lanu effectively mines aspects of everyday observation that, for Tupou, portrays feelings of resilience, fluidity, and the constant change that defines all human cultures.

The threads we see hanging from the underside of Tupou's diamond-shaped pieces are a succinct example of the change that defines his work. Made from parachute chords, these fringes mark a strong contrast with the natural plaited pandanus fibres of fala (woven mats). The addition of fringes, however, refers to the introduction of colourful polyester/wool blends to Tonga's "traditional crafts" as long ago as the nineteenth century, and marks the first appearances of European industrial materials. Fascinated by this early use of foreign materials, Tupou notes a point of cultural convergence, an open-ended hybridity, through which he feels a sense of his own story and history being told.

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




Samuel Tupou Blue Void, 2025 Acrylic on plywood, polypropylene rope 105 x 84cm

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







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
