

Onespace proudly presents *The Grass Tides*, an exhibition by Paula Savage in the Main Gallery. This exhibition, featuring several woven pieces and works on paper is Savage's second exhibition with Onespace gallery. Growing up on Moa Island working the lugger boats with her father and brothers, and with little time to sit around with the old Akas (Aunties), she learned the 'one twist' weaving method herself, through careful observation rather than direct instruction. It remains a constant in her life today. These are the main threads in the weave of Savage's creative output. The prints and weavings presented are a selection of works that mark her development as a senior artist at Moa Arts and a creative force at the top of her game.

For Paula, "The titles of the prints are my interpretation of what I see, put on paper for others to see it too. I imagine putting weaving into a print, using the strokes and wiggles. It's exciting to do these works so that others can see where I'm at. It's another story."

ARTIST BIO

Born in 1982, Paula Savage is a Kala Lagaw Ya-speaking artist from Kubin Community on Moa Island in the near western cluster of the Torres Strait. She is a member of the Serganilgal clan group from the village of Dabu on Moa Island, and the Kaurareg Nation of Muralag and Kiriri.

Paula developed an early interest in art, studying visual and commercial arts during high school. In 2017, she became a member of Ngalmun Lagau Minaral Art Centre (Moa Arts). Her multidisciplinary practice spans weaving, lino printing, tie-dyeing, fabric printing, drawing, carving and jewellery-making. Grounded in her cultural heritage and connection to Country, Savage's practice draws upon traditional knowledge, stories and techniques, whilst reflecting the lived realities that continue to shape everyday life in the Torres Strait Islands.

Her recent group exhibitions include: *Cairns Malu Bardthar Dapar* (2023) Northsite, Cairns; *Darwin Aboriginal Art Fair* (2022) Darwin Convention Centre; *Cairns Indigenous Art Fair* (2022) Cairns convention Centre; *Minaral* (2022) Onespace, Brisbane; *WOW Cairns Women's Show* (2022) NorthSite Contemporary Arts, Cairns; *Tarnanthi Art Fair* (2021) Art Gallery of South Australia, Adelaide; *150ZK Coming of the Light* (2021) Gab Titui Cultural Centre, Thursday Island; *WARWAR: The Art of the Torres Strait* (2021) Newcastle Art Gallery, Newcastle.

Paula was awarded the prestigious 2023 Melbourne Design Week Award and was included in the 2024 and 2026 William Mora Indigenous Art Centre Program (for Moa Arts) at Melbourne Art Fair. She was also a recipient of the Cairns Indigenous Art Fair Innovation Award (2020) and the CICA Lucilla Osborne Memorial Fellowship – Emerging Artist Award (2018). Her Nautilus work is also featured at the new Albert Street station as part of Brisbane's Cross River Rail project.

In weaving and prints, Paula Savage expresses her experience of island life, surrounded and influenced by the sea. Her art is infused with Kala Lagaw Ya traditional knowledge, extended into contemporary art and design. As she says, 'I like to express my art based on our everyday lifestyle, our cultural laws and customs.' ¹

Savage was born on Moa Island in 1982 and studied art at high school. However, it was later, in 2017, that she found her way to the Ngalmun Lagau Minaral Art Centre (Moa Arts). In nine years, she has developed a significant following, having been included in the 2024 and 2026 William Mora Indigenous Art Centre Program (for Moa Arts) at Melbourne Art Fair, and receiving an award at Melbourne Design Week in 2023. Her *Nautilus* work is also featured at the new Albert Street station as part of Brisbane's Cross River Rail project.

In *The Grass Tides*, the central place that weaving holds in the broader spectrum of her work is evident. Weaving is an important cultural tradition throughout the Torres Strait, with woven mats integral to major milestones – births, marriages, deaths – and as a constant signifier of culture.

It is not a practice that Savage learnt from others. She taught herself the traditional one twist (or twist weave) technique through observation, and currently mentors' other artists at Moa Arts, at times hosting workshops, 'encouraging other mob to come with me. It's very hard to get to my mob, to make them understand what I see. My works are all based on my heritage, the cultural laws and customs we still practise today.'

At Moa Arts, materials are brought in from elsewhere to make baskets due to the environmental and cultural rules that govern access to sites and areas. Savage says, 'I can't touch any materials from the land.' This is a result of differing cultural and social protocols practised by each village on the island – Kubin and St Pauls. Savage's father is from Kubin and her mother is from St Pauls. The protocols Savage follows are drawn from both villages and family lines. Yet a childhood spent on the lugger ships and assisting her father, who was a pearl diver, inform her deep knowledge of the sea and its creatures: 'My baskets and works in other media are mostly inspired by the sea.'

These are vibrantly coloured, including decorative shells, with jellyfish baskets heavily fringed and evocative of the trailing tentacles of these sea creatures. Their strong colours are echoed in the prints, with her colour choice across both media reflecting 'what I see in my head'.

For Savage, 'The titles of the prints are my interpretation of what I see, put on paper for others to see it too. I imagine putting weaving into a print, using the strokes and wiggles. It's exciting to do these works so that others can see where I'm at. It's another story.'

Tightly constructed into seemingly abstract patterns, the prints are colourful evidence of her interest in thinking in three dimensions. *Sideways* and *Sideways II* feature rectangular blocks of colour that move in undulating lines across the picture plane. *Tandoo em* uses layers in different hues to evoke the circular motion also used in the weave. *Mixing* describes her

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interest in experimenting with colour combinations, while *Dry Time* records the intensity of the seasonal dry period, and its gradual fade as the vegetation adapts to water stresses.

Women have a special role in the Torres Strait in preserving and conveying culture. Moa Art Centre manager James Muller observed that, 'Paula's work embodies a very personal expression of her lived experience that is intentionally complex and whimsical at the same time.'

For Savage, art-making is integral to building her own knowledge and preserving tradition for the future. In the colour and vibrancy of this work her experience of nature and culture and the proximity of the sea are powerfully expressed.


